

Police Chief Introduction

2018 saw local government changes within the city. Mayor Brian Landers did not run for re-election and Councilman Ed Fox passed away from a long term illness. Ed will be missed.

City Council President Ed Wojnicz ran for Mayor and won. Other changes to council was the addition of Dan Anchor and Ben Anderson. It's nice to see younger people taking on this responsibility. I wish Dan and Ben good luck at what sometimes appears to be a thankless job.

2018 was another safe year for the Wisconsin Dells Police Department with no major injuries sustained by any officers. Although we handle more violent crimes per officer than any department around us, using effective "less lethal" devices like the taser and pepper spray, accompanied by proper training, increases safety and decreases risk.

One positive change to our city occurred when Mayor Wojnicz ordered the removal of the Duchess Plaza. This plaza was set up in the 800 Block of Oak Street with a large boat blocking the intersection and creating a challenge for locals who use the intersection to bypass tourist travel. The police department is thankful for the removal due to it hindering emergency traffic.

Hiring challenges continue in law enforcement nationwide. We were only able to hire 2 patrolmen rather than 4. Although we had enough applicants, we were not happy with the quality. We promoted CSO Blake Fish to LTE and were able to operate with 3 LTEs all summer. Although they were tasked with a lot of work, they succeeded and did a great job.

The 2018 budget allowed for the hiring of a new officer, bringing our staff to 15 full time officers. The CSO program continues to benefit our police department. Tyler Geoffroy was selected as our new officer. Tyler served as a CSO in 2017. 2018 CSOs Blake Fish and Derek Maniak were promoted to LTE Officer for the 2019 Summer and were enrolled in the 2019 Winter Police academy.

I want to personally thank all our dedicated police officers, dispatchers and community service officers for the continuing support to provide professional and community oriented services to the fine citizens of WD !



Police Admin Summary

Each year comes faster and 2018 was no exception. January started with our annual hiring process for our summer Limited Term Employee (officers)

program. These are fully sworn police officers, whose term is from Memorial Day through Labor Day. They work 40 hours/week, assigned to foot patrol in our downtown area. These officers handle the night time calls for service leaving our full-time staff free to handle the other calls throughout the city. The 2018 officers were Micha Dunse, Brendan Cutrell and Blake Fish. All of these officers stayed on to supplement our patrol officers through the end of the year. Both Dunse and Cutrell were hired full-time by the Reedsburg police department. Blake Fish went on to the police academy in January of 2019, along with Community Service Officer Derek Maniak. Tyler Geoffroy accepted a newly created police officer position here in the Spring of 2018. Congratulations to all of these fine police officers for a solid 2018 and a job well done.

Our dispatch staff remained strong in 2018 and we were able to add Devan Dollar as a new part-time dispatcher. Devan brings excellent communication skills and a solid work ethic to our staff. She has a real knack for dispatching and we are very confident in her abilities. Good luck Devan! We're very happy to have you on board.

Mental Health incidents continue to rise nationwide and we have seen it in our area. We were able to send four officers to a week-long Crisis Intervention Team training last fall and the costs were graciously covered by a grant through Sauk County Health. With the transient nature of the tourism industry, these skills can be useful in helping our local residents, tourists or those who are here for a short time in our workforce. We are very appreciative of this training.

Please remember we are continuing participants in the National Drug Take Back Day program and we have a drop box located in the lobby of our police department. If you're not sure where to get rid of leftover or found medication, please bring it to us and we'll see that it gets disposed of properly. Our lobby is open 24/7/365. We empty this drop box several times a month, so please don't dispose of anything into a toilet or down the drain. The safest disposal is to bring it to us.

2018 ended on a high note with our last special event being the Holiday Train. This may be the most fun event for me, even though it's very cold. It's a joy to see so many families come out to see the decorated train and hear the band, while making this a time of giving. This event supports our local Central Wisconsin Community Action Council. It worth every frozen toe I have that day and gives all of us an understanding that 2019 will be better.

Uniform Crime Statistics

As mandated by the Wisconsin Legislature [§16.964(1)(g)], the Wisconsin Office of Justice Assistance (OJA) is responsible for reporting information concerning the number and nature of criminal offenses known to have been committed in the state. This includes collecting crime and arrest data from 399 separate law enforcement agencies for the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting Program (a nationwide cooperative statistical effort of more than 17,000 law enforcement agencies voluntarily reporting data on crime). The primary objective of UCR is to generate reliable information for use in law enforcement administration, operation, and management. Today, the American public looks to the Uniform Crime Reports for information on fluctuations in the level of crime, and criminologists, sociologist, legislators, municipal planners, the media, and other students of criminal justice use the statistics for varied research and planning purposes.

This report, prepared by the OJA Statistical Analysis Center (SAC), is a collection of crime data reported to Wisconsin law enforcement agencies in 2015. It contains detailed information on crime volume, rates, and trends on eight major criminal offenses as designated by the FBI: Murder, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson.

Drug Investigations

The Wisconsin Dells Police Department's stance and my stance as the department's supervisory officer of drug enforcement, is zero tolerance with illicit drug use. The Wisconsin Dells Police Department investigates incidents of illicit drug use almost daily. These incidents range from illicit drugs being found during vehicle searches, illicit drugs being found during execution of a search warrant or having contact with persons under the influence of illicit drugs.

With the strong push of the legalization of marijuana in the U.S., it has been reported that many issues among children and young adults are on the rise. The acceptance of recreational marijuana use has shown that young people are starting to use it at an earlier age.

According to NIH (National Institute on Drug Abuse) reports, most juveniles first use marijuana starting in the 8th grade. This is hard to combat due to the availably of the drug. Many reports show that once a person has tried marijuana, it leads to further drug use such as meth and heroin. When dealing with a person for a drug related incident I always make a point to ask that person this question, "what was the first drug you ever used"? One hundred percent of the time, the answer was marijuana.

A study by Duke University shows that juveniles who smoke marijuana weekly prior to the age of 18 show long term affects such as intelligence, attention and memory loss. It also stated that even if that person later quit marijuana use the affects would not be reversed. One of the best ways to combat this is heavy drug enforcement in school. This is the main social hub for kids and where they learn a vast majority about drugs. I work closely with the Wisconsin Dells School Resource Officer to learn common trends that students use. All school grounds including parking lots are searched by K9 teams at least once a quarter. During this time the schools are put on lockdown and the grounds are searched. If anything illegal is located, the student is removed, questioned and parents are contacted. Many times if a student violates the schools drug policy it results in school discipline such a suspension or expulsion. If needed criminal action will be taken.

I feel very strongly that juveniles need to be protected against marijuana use, no matter what the social acceptance is.



In the spring of 2018 a Police K9 was reintroduced to the department. The K9 is a dual purpose working dog with a heavy emphasis on drug related crimes. The K9 team trains for 4 weeks on subject apprehension and drug detection. The K9 team learns to apprehend criminals, track suspects and missing persons. The K9 is trained to detect Marijuana, Cocaine, 3,4-Methylenedioxymethamphetamine (MDMA), Heroin, and Methamphetamine.

The team is then dual certified with the trainer and American Police Canine Association. The team trains a minimum of 16 hours a month and recertifies annually. The team is not only used by WDPD, but it also assists all surrounding agencies if needed. The K9 is a priceless tool for the community and a great deterrent as well.

Common trends to follow are the uses of CBD oils. CBD means cannabidiol. It is an active ingredient of cannabis and comes from the hemp plant. The main difference between hemp and marijuana is, hemp has nearly no THC (tetrahydrocannabinol). THC is the main ingredient in marijuana. A hemp plant and a marijuana plant both contain THC, but a hemp plant must contain less than .3 present THC to be labeled hemp.

Many makers and sellers of CBD oils claim there is no THC in CBD, but that is indeed false. The level is not to precede .3 present which makes it legal. However one can fail a drug test with the use of CBD products because they do contain THC.

CBD oils are being heavily pushed as a cure for medical reasons. CBD oils claim to assist with pain management, arthritis and migraines. Some side effects are tiredness, diarrhea, appetite change and weight gain or loss. As of recent, there has been no significant medical proof CBD oils assist with medical issues. Some common way to use CBD oils are used include, vaping, pills, oils balms, edibles, beverages and many others.

In closing, we will continue to fight the drug epidemic. It matters not what some social acceptance is regarding drug use, the laws are in place to protect everyone in the community and we at WDPD will continue to enforce those laws.

2018 Training

In 2018, The Wisconsin Dells Police Department continued its trend to exceed training requirements as required by the state. WDPD Officers compiled nearly 1,050 hours of training for the year which is approximately 70 hours of training per officer. This exceeds the Department of Justice standards of a minimum of 24 hours of continuing education. These trainings include classroom, web-based training, and hands on training. Some of the specialized trainings that officers attended include: Defense and Arrest Tactics, Pursuit and emergency vehicle operation training, and Forensic Interviewing. Officer's complete monthly web-based trainings covering a variety of topics and recertification's as well. Every year officers are also required to attend a 16-hour county wide in-service training. The Wisconsin Dells Police Department attempts to keep most training in-house to avoid costly over-time. Below is a list of Officers who are certified to teach specific unified tactics.

2018 Columbia County Emergency Response Team Participation

The Wisconsin Dells Police Department currently assigns one officer to the Columbia County Sheriff's Office Emergency Response Team (ERT). The assigned officer is Sgt. Nick Brinker. Sgt Brinker currently serves as the Team leader for the ERT. The Columbia County ERT is trained in hostage rescue, barricaded subjects, sniper situations, high risk apprehension, high risk warrant service, and personal protection. The ERT trains twice a month, with the training material varying from training to training. This accounts for nearly 100 hours of additional training per year for Sgt. Brinker. The members of the ERT are on call for emergency situations 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. The members are on a pager system, which provides for a rapid response in emergencies.

In 2018, the Columbia County ERT responded to only one emergency call for service:

- <u>April 29th, 2018, Columbus, WI</u> – ERT responded to an armed and barricaded subject, who had shot another individual in Columbus, WI. The suspect was found deceased in the home upon entry by the ERT after negotiations had failed.



2018 Special Events

The Wisconsin Dells Police Department assists the community with helping to organize, provide security and plan special events. This year there were a few less events, but the number of hours increased as some events have grown, which is still helping to turn the Wisconsin Dells area into a year- round destination. WDPD spent approximately **783 hours** assisting with Special Events.

2018 Grants

Funded DOT Bureau of Transportation Grants

In late 2014 Chief Ward formed a task force compromising Columbia County agencies. The purpose of the task force was to secure more grant funding through the Bureau of Transportation and Safety (BOTS). In 2018 the task force was approved for only one grant. This was a speed enforcement grant totaling \$30,000.

The task force agencies are the Wisconsin Dells Police Department, Columbia County Sheriff's Office, Portage Police Department, Lodi Police Department, Wyocena Police Department and Fall River Police Department.

The Wisconsin Dells Police Department received over \$13,000 in overtime funds.

Non-Funded DOT Bureau of Transportation Grants

The Wisconsin Dells Police Department continually takes part in BOTS non-funded grants. These grants focus on seat belt usage and OWI Enforcement. Although they are non-funded they provide important statistics to the state, make our community safer and enter us in a \$4,000.00 equipment drawing.




